The publication of the Welsh Government's refreshed Anti-Racist Wales Action Plan emphasises the changes required to make Wales an anti-racist nation by 2030, including within the housing and homelessness sector. As part of our commitment to support this work, we are delighted to welcome Georgia Leith from Crisis to talk about their research about racism and homelessness. This research, shaped by a panel of Experts by Experience, uncovers the human stories behind the statistics that draw a direct link between race and homelessness. These real-life accounts show us how racism and discrimination can negatively impact every area of a person's life – preventing them from finding a home, a job or accessing healthcare.
